Through the New Testament in 42 days

This reading scheme will take you through the NT in 6 weeks. You will be reading relatively large chunks of the Bible, so *very* brief notes have been added to help you keep your bearings. The scheme does not follow the canonical order of the NT. Instead you will read the writings of Luke, then those of Paul (presented in what approximates the order in which they may have been written), then those influenced or written by Peter, then those with a stronger Jewish flavour, and finally the writings of John.

Day 15	2 Corinthians	The most intense, revealing & emotional of Paul's letters.
Day 16	Romans 1-8	Here is the Gospel – it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes.
Day 17	Romans 9-16	
Day 18	Ephesians	The most sublime and majestic expression of the Gospel.
Day 19	Colossians and Philemon	We have everything in Jesus Christ!
Day 20	Philippians	Living a life worthy of the gospel.
Day 21	1 Timothy and Titus	Normal church life for the post-apostolic age.

Day 22	2 Timothy	How to live well; how to die well.
Day 23	Matthew 1-7	Matthew's is the most Jewish of the gospels. He presents Jesus as a new (and greater than) Moses. Jesus is the fulfilment of the Old Testament. Matthew's account of the gospel comprises five blocks of teaching, each ending "it came to pass when Jesus finished teaching all these things"

Day 26	Matthew 22-28	
Day 27	Hebrews 1-7	Hebrews is a written sermon whose text is <i>Exodus</i> and whose purpose is to stir up tired, flagging, discouraged Christians to maintain their commitment to Jesus Christ.
Day 28	Hebrews 8-13	
Day 29	James	A practical exposition of the Holiness Code of Leviticus.
Day 30	Mark 1:1-9:1	Enjoy Mark's presentation of the gospel – it is fast paced, vivid and emotional. There is a striking similarity between the structure of Mark and Peter's sermon in the home of Cornelius (Act 10:34-43).
Day 31	Mark 9:2-16:20	
Day 32	1 Peter	1 Peter is the most condensed résumé of the Christian faith and the conduct it inspires.
Day 33	2 Peter and Jude	
Day 34	John 1-5	John's gospel is distinctive. This scheme will take you through it quickly – but come back and read it more slowly. Watch out for seven sign-miracles, seven "I am" sayings and seven discourses.

Day 39	1, 2 and 3 John	"I am writing because" (1 John 1:4; 2:1; 2:26; 5:13)
Day 40	Revelation 1-7	Living between the first and second comings of the Lord Jesus, we need encouragement to remain faithful. This letter-prophecy reveals that things mustn't be taken at face value – God is on the throne (Rev. 4-5) and is in control of history, driving it to his chosen destination.
